	<u>Lt Wes Herman</u> IMPACT- Police/Crime report for Citrus Heights			
	He began by explaining there were two email items he did not have an answer to but he would follow up: 1) the equipment stored at the corner of Wintergreen and Old Auburn Blvd, and 2) the motor bikes on the walking paths. Also, he will follow up on the storage of cars at that same corner.  Updates on crime stats: property theft is still up. These increased numbers are likely due to PD actively encouraging retailers to always report a theft. Prop 36 was enacted that is helping to prosecute retail thefts. The car readers at stop lights have been extremely helpful in catching fleeing criminals, not only for theft but also for assault, etc.			
	Arson is on the increase, mostly due to warming fires set by the unhoused.			
	Stolen vehicles: so far this year, there have been 105 vehicles stolen. In 2024, for this same time period, that number was 211. A 50% reduction!

Prop 36 was overwhelmingly approved by State voters. At a recent meeting, Josh Hoover gave an interesting statistic on this matter. It was requested this proposition be funded at \$400 million. It was funded at only half that, \$200 million. She encouraged everyone to lobby Senator Roger Niello and Assemblyman Josh Hoover for increasing the funding because crime is a number one issue.

Larry Fritz	The event of April 23, 1	1973, the Roseville	Railyard Explosion

Larry began his presentation with a brief introduction of his life in Citrus Heights, first as a young man and then later in life when he bought his home behind Mt. Vernon Memorial Cemetery. He went on with a brief history of Fire Station 6, the first fire station built in Antelope (right near the railyards). There were many boxcars sitting on the rails with many, many bombs loaded in them bound for soldiers' use in Vietnam. They never fully understood why the bombs exploded, but the theory is that a fire started due to sparks from the wheel brakes catching the wooden floor on fire under one of the boxcars. He gave a slide presentation on what Citrus Heights looked like, in terms of size, back in 1973. Citrus Heights, and especially Antelope, was small and rural at that time. But the bombs did a lot of damage. He showed what things looked like after the explosions. For two and a half hours, bombs were exploding. 18 boxcars were demolished, as was Fire Station 6. And explosions continued as some bombs were ripped open, scattering their explosive materiel all over. Lastly, he shared an artifact, a piece of metal, all twisted and torn, impossible to identify what it was before the explosion. This was a very interesting and informative presentation.
